CONFERENCE REGISTRATION

Conference registration opens November 12, 2016 at 9 am. There will be a link to the online registration through the CNCH website (cnch2017.regfox.com/cnch-2017). Early Bird Registration ends January 31, 2017. Last date for online registration is April 1, 2017. Any cancellations received after April 1, 2017 receive no refund. Prior to April 1, the refund will be fees paid minus a \$50 administration fee. All refunds will be sent after the conclusion of the conference. There will be no on-site registration.

CNCH GRANT

Conference Grant Information and Requirements:

- 1. To be eligible for the grant, the applicant must be a member in good standing of a guild which is a member of CNCH, Inc. Applicant must not have been awarded this grant in the past five years.
- 2. Five grants in the amount of the Early Bird registration of \$350 are available for CNCH 2017 Conference, one for each Area.
- 3. The grant committee consists of at least three members from the CNCH Advisory Board. The committee does not have access to applicants' names.
- 4. Applications will be available on the web site, www.cnch.org, from guild liaisons, or by contacting the CNCH Administrative Assistant, Erin Maclean, Advisory@CNCH.org or P.O. Box 191119, Sacramento, CA 95819-1119.
- 5. Awards will not be made on the basis of financial need. The applicant will describe the applicant's fiber interests and the applicant's reasons for wanting to attend CNCH 2017 Conference. Selection will be based on both the applicant's personal goals and upon how they plan to share their experience with their guild.
- 6. Applications are due by November 14, 2016. The grant committee will make its selection for the awards by November 30, 2016. Applicants should register online and each recipient will be sent a check from CNCH, Inc. once registration and guild membership is confirmed.
- 7. WORKSHOPS

Shifu Journey: Spinning and Weaving Mulberry Paper and More

A Workshop with Donna Sakamoto Crispin

Skill level: Beginner to Advanced; all levels

Shifu is the Japanese art of cutting and spinning washi paper and weaving it into cloth. Donna will show you the traditional way and some unconventional ways to create your own paper thread and cord. We will spin washi paper, old pattern paper, and more. You will learn



how to spin the paper in several different ways, from a drop spindle to a drill. On the second day, beginners will use their paper yarns to make a woven sampler on a small loom. More advanced weavers will weave a basket, 3"4" across and tall. On our last day, students will have a choice of making a basket or a woven pendant. Participants choosing the pendant will learn a variety of basketry techniques including twining, reverse twining, color placement, twill weave and full turn twining.



Donna Sakamoto Crispin has been creating baskets and teaching workshops since 1986. Influences from Japanese and Northwest cultures, fiber, clay and metals can be seen in her baskets and other woven pieces. She enjoys sharing her weaving experiences with others and passing along traditional crafts.

Materials list: Teacher will provide Thai unryu paper, hemp and cotton thread, beads, Habu paper yarns and small weaving looms. A materials list will be provided in advance to all participants.

The Unwoven Warp: Layering Sprang on Woven Cloth (twill with variations)

A Workshop with Deanna Deeds Skill level: Intermediate

Learn to add sprang braided accents to your handwoven creations by leaving pattern warp unwoven in select areas, using a modified twill structure that creates supplementary warps. Sprang is a stretchy, net like fabric formed by the twisting of warp threads with each other. The elastic fabric thus formed is layered on



regular woven cloth for exciting new possibilities in design.

Students will come with looms pre-warped and will learn how to tension the ground and pattern warps, weave the background, work an interlinked sprang motif and secure it. You will also learn how to start and stop the motifs to place them alone or simultaneously with another, and vary the size and shape of the sprang.

In addition, we will have opportunity to try alternate treadling (lift) sequences for variations of background fabric, try alternate pattern warp yarns, and explore other sprang structures if desired. The class will include structures in which supplementary warp floats can be formed.



An ex-engineer who has loved fiber since childhood, Deanna Deeds has been captivated for the past 30 years by the beauty of the mathematical relationships found in weaving. Focusing on form, interlacement and structure, she has developed a method of combining loom-controlled woven cloth with sprang, an ancient hand-manipulated technique. www.fiberartisan.com Student materials fee: \$5.00 (includes pre-workshop and in-class handouts, stopcord, needles, alternate warp yarns).

Materials list: A materials list will be provided in advance to all participants. A 4-shaft (simple pick-up required) or 8-shaft loom with 12-dent reed and at least 8-inch weaving width required.

Off the Grid

A Workshop with Elisabeth Hill Skill level: Must be able to warp a loom and be able to read a draft.

Feeling hemmed in by the ho-hum of parallels and perpendiculars? Join Lisa on an adventure out of the straight and narrow! In an on-loom round robin format we will weave multiple samples in 4- and 8- shaft structures that allow the warp and weft to shift and move, creating a dizzving array of curves, undulations and textures. Each participant will be mailed a warp in a different fiber/structure with full instructions for dressing. In class we will weave samples and variations, learn techniques and tips for weaving these structures, learn how they are related to one another and reinforce our understanding with drafting exercises. We will also examine and discuss a wide array of fabric samples in class.





Elisabeth (Lisa) Hill has been weaving for over 20 years and completed a 6 year Master Weaver program at Hill Institute in Florence, MA, in 2012. She is the program chair of the Weavers of Western Massachusetts, a faculty member at Vavstruga Weaving School and one of a team of tech editors for *Handwoven* Magazine. www.plainweave.net

Materials list: Pre-warped 4- or 8-shaft loom, writing materials, 2 shuttles, 4 bobbins and miscellaneous weaving supplies such as scissors, measuring tape, tapestry needle, etc.

Kumihimo – Japanese Braiding, Beading and Beyond

A Workshop with Karen Huntoon Skill level: Beginner to Intermediate

Kumihimo is a Japanese form of braid making and this workshop will be "hands on" with lots of samples for inspiration, written materials and kits. While learning new skills and techniques participants will be able to tie each learning block into a completed project. Starting with the basics of braiding a round braid on a foam Kumihimo disk you will then complete an 8-strand cluster bead bracelet, a blended beaded necklace and will experiment with a 12-strand ridge spiral braid. In addition there will be demonstrations of braiding on a Marudai weaving stand with fiber and with beads.





Besides teaching, Karen is an owner of an online business devoted to Kumihimo. She braids with fiber and with beads and uses the foam disk and plate, the Marudai and most recently the Takadai. Karen leads yearly kumihimo/knitting tours to Mexico and Guatamala. As she notes on her website "my brain never gets tired of thinking of how Kumihimo works, what I can do with it next, and how I can share it with others." www.whatabraid.com

Student materials fee: \$50.00. Fee will cover discs, cords and beads. Instructor will email participants as to their choice of color of fiber/beads for the various projects. *Materials list*: Weldbond glue, scissors, tape measure, reading glasses or magnifier.

Weaving with Non-Traditional Materials: An Exploration of Unusual, Innovative, and Just Simply Funky Yarns

A Workshop with Giovanna Imperia Skill level: Intermediate to Advanced (this is not a "learn to weave" workshop).

Ever been intrigued by unusual materials but not been able to figure out how to use them? Then, this is the workshop for you. In this fun filled workshop you will find answers to questions you may have had and did not know who to ask: What is polyurethane? Why would I want to use thermoplastic? What is the point



of combining bast or protein fibers with metal? What is elastane and how do I make friends with it? What is metal, what is metallic? Can I weave with metal thinner than hair, and why would I want to do that? And much, much more.

Come to class with a pre-warped loom and begin the creative exploration of a variety of unique materials ranging from polyurethane coated yarns to 40 micron wire (finer than your hair!) to a variety of plastics and thermoplastics. Create your own sampler while testing the properties of these materials. On the second day, you will be able to continue this exciting exploration by warping some of the more suitable materials and test their properties in the warp and the weft. Appropriate finishing techniques will be discussed.

You will be coached on the idiosyncrasies of a wide variety of funky and futuristic yarns, including handling, warping, weaving, braiding, selecting the right yarns for the look and feel that you want and using their tricky ways effectively, to give you the results that you want. Permutations can be infinite so warping materials will be limited to just a few. This will give us time to discuss issues that may arise when warping and will also limit the number of finishing techniques we will cover to a manageable number.



Most of Giovanna Imperia's work focuses on the exploration of the tactile and organic nature of fiber and related materials while pushing the boundaries of the expected definition of body adornment and 3D objects. She has written 2 books on kumihimo and a number of weaving articles. Her work has been exhibited nationally and internationally. Besides teaching Giovanna is the owner of an online yarn boutique specializing in unusual yarns. www.

Student Materials Fee: \$75.00 - this includes all the weft material for Day 1, and warp and weft material for Day 2. Materials List: A materials list and warping instructions will be

provided in advance to all participants. This class will require a 4- to 8-shaft table or floor loom, preferably with Texsolv heddles – no twisted wire heddles please.

Chase Twills

A Workshop with Annetta Kraayeveld Skill level: Twill experience necessary.

Twill baskets with a little bit of a twist! The focus of this workshop is chase twills, twill weaving with two weavers. Students will make two baskets. First, Voltage, a fun chase twill that uses color placement and chase twill weaving to create an eye catching design. Then students will weave



the Leather and Lace Tote with its unique base and more complex chase twill. Workshop discussions will include twill design and how to do the math to create a chase twill basket. Shaping techniques are also emphasized. Workshop includes all weaving material and instruction booklet.



Annetta Kraayeveld finds great satisfaction working with her hands, merging the age old form of basketry with the contemporary world. Creating functional art pieces is her passion. Annetta's work has earned several awards and she has been teaching at basketry events and guilds across North America since 2000.

Materials list: Students should bring a short bent packer or flat ended screwdriver, sharp basket or garden cutters, #20 tapestry needle and a sharp knife or rim scraper.

Spinning Spectacular Knitting Yarns

A Workshop with Kate Larson Skill level: Ability to spin and ply a basic yarn. Basic knitting skills (cast-on, bindoff, knit and purl stitches).

Starting a new project often begins with the perfect yarn, the perfect pattern, or a grand idea. Handspinning our own knitting yarns gives us endless opportunities to create exactly what we want, and breaking the design process into



steps can aid everyone from the precision spinner and knitter to the most freeform. This class will help guide you through the process of choosing a fiber and yarn design, keeping gauge consistent, estimating fiber and yardage, washing and finishing knitting yarns, and more.

Kate will share her method of record keeping that never leaves spontaneity and creativity behind, and you will have the opportunity to see plenty of examples of her work. We will play with a wide variety of fibers and yarn styles and discuss different uses such as socks, lace, and two-color knitting. Leave class with a spinner's idea notebook brimming with possibilities for your next project. This workshop welcomes a wide variety of skill levels and is designed to help you create your own unique textiles.



Kate Larson loves using fiber arts as a bridge between art and agriculture. She is the author of *The Practical Spinner's Guide: Wool* (Interweave, 2015) and several videos, including *How to Spin Yarn to Knit.* Her work has appeared in *Spin-off, Jane Austen Knits*, and more. Follow her at KateLarsonTextiles.com

Student materials fee: \$15.00

Materials list: A spindle or working wheel, extra bobbins, and lazy kate. You will need handcards for this class-some will be available to borrow-and a few sets of knitting needles in sizes you typically use.

Colorhue Instant Silk Dyeing and Printing

A Workshop with Barbara Setsu Pickett Skill level: Any level student is welcome to join in the fun.

Colorhue is a liquid, highly concentrated, non-toxic, fiber-reactive dye designed especially for silk. It comes in 10 hues. It does not need additional chemicals or heat and fixes immediately without chemical fixer, no batching, no ironing to set the color. Because it strikes so quickly you can achieve unique color effects like iridescence. It needs almost no rinsing, saving water, energy and time.



Using the 10 base colors and a tri-axial color scale we will make 21 hues from 3 primaries. Optically mix hues by layering sheer silks. Learn scrunch dyeing by massaging the silk goods in a small amount of dye in a sealable baggie. Achieve iridescent effects by quick successive over dyes. Experiment printing with Colorhue by adding it to shaving cream and applying it through thermofax screens or freezer paper stencils.



Barbara Setsu Pickett is an Associate Professor Emeritus in the Art Department at the University of Oregon. Her art and research focus on velvet weaving, Jacquard design, and shibori. She has researched velvet weaving both in Europe and Asia. With her son Michael she runs the Mihara Shibori Studio and creates silk shibori scarves. Barbara has received numerous awards, nationally and internationally, for her work. Student materials fee: \$40.00. Payment to cover dyes, supplies, silk fabric and instruction manual. Materials list: A materials list will be provided in advance to all participants.

New Uses of An Ancient Technique

A Workshop with Lois Russell Skill Level: All skill levels are welcome and students will be able to find their own level.

Basket making is an ancient craft rich in tradition and technique. Today's artists are using age-old techniques to create sculptural pieces that challenge the definition of "basket." This class will focus on twining, using colorful waxed linen thread. Students will begin with a small pre-made base to make sure they have the basics before exploring the many possibilities of pattern, shape and texture. The focus of the class is technique and using those techniques to create something unique.



Lois Russell makes sculptural basket forms by twining waxed linen. Her award winning work has

been included in many exhibitions and publications. Lois served as president of the National Basketry Organization and now serves on the board of Craft Emergency Relief Fund and the Society of Arts and Crafts in Boston.

Princess Breeds: Turbo-Charged

A Workshop with Beth Smith Skill level: Participants should be able to spin a continuous thread.

Take an enchanted journey with fairy tale princesses and the princesses of the animal world: sheep. The class connects the spirit of each movie princess with a particular breed of sheep. Which breed is strong, brave? Which breed



is daring and cunning? Which breed is the fairest of them all?

We will spend 2 ½ days covering the ins and outs of 15 sheep breeds, the history of each breed and every detail about each breed's fleece. We will learn a few methods of scouring fleece and the reasons behind each method. Then working from washed, unprocessed fleece we will learn to comb, flick, and card. Through sampling we can determine what processing and spinning method work best with each breed.

A sprinkle of fairy dust will keep the fun in our spinning and you will be whistling while you work all the day through!



Beth Smith is obsessed with wool. She teaches the why and how-tos of preparing and spinning as many breeds as a spinner can. Almost everything she knows is in her two books, The Spinner's Book of Fleece: A Breed by Breed Guide to Choosing and Spinning the Perfect Fiber for Every Purpose, and, How to Spin.

Materials list: Spindle or spinning wheel in good working order. Also, hand combs or minicombs and a diz, a flick and handcards as well as a sturdy table cloth. If you do not own these tools a few will be available to borrow during class. In addition, a pen and note taking material are useful.

Tied up in a Magical Box: Tied Weaves and Tied Weave Threadings

A Workshop with Robyn Spady Skill level: Adventure-seeking beginners through advanced weavers

Tied weaves create patterned fabric with floats of limited length. It's also an extremely versatile weave capable of amazing results. One of the most overlooked and minimized features of designing and drafting tied weaves and developing new patterns is the tie-up. One threading can provide a multitude of different treadling



options – from singles and pairs to Dukagang and taquete. Why? Because of the ability to make subtle-to-major changes in the tie-up, treadling sequence, and wefts. Participants will learn the fundamentals of tied weaves and explore a number of variations. There will be a portion of the workshop dedicated to design. If you're a weaver interested in understanding terms like summer & winter, single 2-tie, taquete, and samitum or would like to get acquainted with Bergman and Quigley, then this workshop is for you!



Robyn Spady learned to weave in 1969. She is committed to turning the weaving world on to the infinite possibilities of crossing threads and loves coming up with new ideas to create fabric and transform it into something new and exciting. Robyn is also founder and editor of *Heddlecraft* magazine.

More Than Just Black and White: Weaving Beautifully

with Neutrals

A Workshop with Betty Vera Skill Level: All levels, Beginner to Advanced (must be able to warp and weave on a harness loom unaided; this class not for those who have never woven before).

Black, white, grays, browns, and beiges are anything but neutral when used skillfully – providing design effects ranging from intense drama to a soft mood. Neutrals also emphasize texture and set off other colors beautifully. And



subtle colors themselves can be used to create a palette of "neutrals." This class concentrates on combining light-and-dark tones effectively, using warm and cool neutrals, exploring the textural range of different yarns and weaves, and enhancing the graphic potential of woven design. Each warp will be threaded differently so that everyone can weave round robin and take home a notebook of swatches of every fabric woven in class. Participants will receive warping and threading instructions in advance of the workshop so they can arrive ready to weave. Handouts will include complete weaving instructions for every warp, a variety of weft yarns, and all swatch notebook supplies.



Betty Vera loves how colors interact in weaving, whether in the hand woven warp-painted tapestries she makes or her computer-assisted Jacquard tapestries. A former fibers instructor at Montclair (NJ) State University and New York's Fashion Institute of Technology, she now lives in Massachusetts and divides her time between workshop teaching and her studio practice. www.bettyvera.com

personal weaving tools; a few weft yarns to try; and note-taking supplies. A bobbin winder is not required of each student but it will be helpful if one or two students can bring one for the class to share.

A Workshop with Mary Zicafoose Skill level: all levels

Artist and weaver Mary Zicafoose will present a trifecta of one-day workshops to stimulate visual thinking and ignite your creative work in textiles. Each day will be approached as an individual unit of study which will include 2-D studio exercises; reflection and the written word; goal setting; power points; and the excitement of new points of view specific to your personal story in cloth.

Day #1: Color. How does your use of color define you and your work? This day of applied study will help to develop your eye for color and lay a foundation to expand your color fluency.



Focus will be on color intuition and personal voice creating a color journal using color-aid silk screened papers employing selected exercises of colorist Josef Albers.

Day #2: Creative Process. This is a fast paced full day of 2-D and 3-D design exercises, individual critique, and discussions selected to stimulate and energize your creative thinking, expand work into a series, and stimulate new approaches to creating new work.

Day#3: Content. Today is devoted to creating and refining your personal literature – how you speak and write about your work. We will also cover tools for greater efficiency, productivity and goal setting and set a curriculum to re-invigorate your studio practices.
